Reclaiming Futures, Kids Success/Neighborhood Strength by Sarah Didier

As promised at the October Semiannual Meeting, I will be doing successive articles on the seminars I attended while in Dayton at the Regional Neighborhood Network Conference. The first seminar was given by Judge Anthony Capizzi of the Montgomery County Juvenile Court in Dayton, OH. Judge Capizzi deals primarily with children up to age 18, but sometimes he encounters those who are a bit older. The first juvenile court was developed in Cook County, OH as a means for juvenile rehabilitation. Those children who become part of the rehabilitation process encounter stability, consequences for their actions, and reward for accomplishments. Many have never had any of these variables in their lives. Judge Capizzi said that no matter where you live in the country, 65% of the youth in court, have a drug or drug/alcohol problem. 10-12% more have mental health problems which ultimately lead to drug or drug/alcohol problems. No matter what the statistics are, 65% of the youth, ages 13-16, are doing drugs/alcohol on a weekly basis. As an example: a 12 year old child has 27 year old parents, 47 year old grandparents, and 65 year old great grandparents. Studies show that a child's brain is not mature until age 25, so we have kids raising kids. Who is there to tell this 12 year old child to go to bed so they can get enough sleep that they are able to learn in school? The answer is ... no one.

The Problem:

- Too many teens today are struggling with drugs, alcohol and crime
- More than 2 million children are arrested each year in the US
- 4/5 of the teens in the juvenile justice system are under the influence of alcohol or drugs while committing crimes

- Only 10% of youth with substance abuse disorders actually receive treatment
- 2/3 of juvenile detention facilities are holding children who are awaiting mental health treatment

What we Know:

- These kids are not "bad kids"
- They are kids who need treatment and community support

Treatment:

- Helps reduce recidivism. 52% of youth without treatment will commit another crime. With treatment that number falls to 18%.
- Saves money
- Builds safer communities

Montgomery County's Solution:

- Reclaiming Futures Montgomery County, OH has a national movement to try and make this work throughout the country. There is already 1 court in Indiana using the same method as Montgomery County.
- Natural Helper Program this is not a person who says "look at me and be like me", but says "let's look at you and see what you need"
- Merge Church with State Judge Capizzi goes frequently to the faith community in Montgomery County for Natural Helpers.

Neighborhoods have a tendency to focus on insignificant things such as whether the garbage is picked up, but forget because of drugs and kids in trouble, that is why our neighborhoods are dirty. Creating a community center for 9-18 year olds to attend after school is out has helped many communities in Montgomery County, OH. Coming up with a partnership to create activities for the youth helps to keep kids out of trouble. If neighborhoods have things that need to be done, get the youth in that neighborhood involved in "community service" to help with those projects. This helps neighborhoods to become strength based instead of focusing on the negative.

Now, on a closer to home note, I would like to see someone begin a program in Indian Village for our youth. Let's get our young residents involved and helping where they can help in our neighborhood. Our youth are the future of Indian Village. I grew up here and now 38 years after leaving, I moved back to the placed I loved as a child and am serving of the Board of Governors. Wouldn't it be wonderful to get our youth involved enough that they want to come back in their adult years and become leaders of Indian Village? I would like to see someone in Indian Village step up to the plate and head up a committee for our youth. It could be a twofold committee that 1. puts the youth to work on projects within Indian Village and 2. reports to the Board of Governors ideas and/or concerns of the youth residing in Indian Village.
